National Beach Safety Week

- At the request of the Public Education Committee, I sent a letter to Governor Wilson requesting declaration of May 22 - 29 as National Beach Safety Week in California.
- No response as of yet.

International Lifesaving Federation

- At the request of USLA International Liaison Tom Daly, I assumed the position of President for the Americas of the International Lifesaving Federation early this year.
- This position includes presidency of North, Central, and South America; but only the US and Canada are member nations at this time.
- ILS is formed from the fusion of World Lifesaving and FIS, which merged in September of 1994.
- I attended the first Board of Directors meeting in Belgium in February at the new headquarters.
- I was very impressed by the high level commitment of organizations like ours from around the world.

International Lifesaving Games

- Rescue '96, the world lifeguard championships, will be held in Durban, South Africa from May 10 -19, 1996.
- O We need to consider ways to send competitors.
- Airline tickets presently cost in excess of \$2,000 each.
- Accommodations in South Africa appear to be relatively inexpensive. Hotels are available for \$42 per person per night, double occupancy at current exchange rates.
- Cost per competitor should be budgeted at approximately \$3,000 each, including airfare, hotel, registration, and meals.

Internet

- Currently exploring ways to get CSLSA on the Internet, along with USLA.
- Expected cost is in the neighborhood of \$300 to \$500.
- Would allow us to get our message of beach safety to the public in the method likely to be most used in the coming years.

Elections

- A reminder to all that elections are coming at the fall meeting.
- O Those interested in running should begin thinking about this now.

Competition

- The CSLSA competition has been moved due to venue problems. This will be discussed in the Competition Committee.
- The national competition will take place in Santa Cruz on August 10 - 12. Junior lifeguards will compete on August 10 and regular members on August 11 and 12.
- O Yamaha has contributed a significant amount to be the major sponsor of the event.
- Flyers will be distributed at the national meeting in Alexandria.

- In light of the occurrences in Oklahoma City and in Sacramento, any problems we may have in the CSLSA should seem minuscule.
- The USLA Manual of Open Water Lifesaving is now in print. I have received a copy and it looks great. Congratulations to our President, Chris Brewster for his tireless efforts.
- A BIG thank you is owed to Rick Gould for keeping our National Administrative Manual up to date.
- Another thanks to Kai Weisser for his efforts on the 1995 CSLSA Lifeguard Exam Survey.
- Our Treasurer will probably tell you that our finances are in dire straits, but I think that we can pull out. We need to have a strong membership drive, and with the help of the membership kit, including a bag, mugs, sunscreen product and a decal I think we'll be OK.
- In my discussions with our fund raiser, Scott Hubble, I learned that Details Magazine, that was to have funded our Regionals tried to pull out, but that he was able to convince them to commit to a \$5000.00 sponsorship. He has also contracted with Ford to help sponsor us.
- One thing we need to address to make the CSLSA more appealing to potential sponsors is "What does the CSLSA have to offer to a Sponsor?"
- We have committed CSLSA funds to produce a Public Safety poster that may have been able to have been underwritten by a sponsor. We need to present these types of proposals in writing to potential sponsors.
- "Fitness Swimmer", a new publication by Rodale Press is interested in sponsoring Regionals. We may be able to realize a few dollars from them this year. Hopefully this can work into a future long term prospect.

For the Good of the Order

During the past two or three meetings several issues have been very disturbing to me. Issues relating to LA County and State Beach and the interations between individuals of those agencies; rumours or just plain open discussion about personalities, agencies or problems that should be kept internal and not outwardly discussed in public, are examples of what I mean.

I now have a scanner and the artwork and will be presenting a couple of options to the Executive Board for selection of a new CSLSA letterhead style.


Election of Officers

1994 Lifesaving Statistics and 30 Year Historical Review

Since inception as the National Surf Life Saving Association in 1964, the chapters and agencies involved in lifesaving efforts in California and the Western United States have endeavored to record the activity performed by their lifeguards. These records have been compiled in a statistical format to record the various categories of activity performed by these agencies. The Association, now known as the California Surf Life Saving Association (CSLA), has published this information for many years for several purposes. The main function is to educate the public about the profession of lifesaving. The statistics also serve to highlight particular professional areas of interest, to provide tools in agency budget development and to further the knowledge base about the open water environment.

This report highlights the 1994 statistics of the CSLA and a historical review of the last 30 years. Highly significant to this year's report is the inclusion of *Primary Cause of Rescues* data, the first year the Association has undertaken a regional view of the causes of rescues. Next, drowning locations are viewed over the last decade. In addition, the report presents analysis of trends as they relate to specific statistical categories. The report also presents a new statistical observation, environmental conditions. While the category is subjective, the information should allow the Association to compare wind, surf and weather trends against rescue data. Finally, the report presents data which has not been compiled previously: the historical statistics totals for the California Surf Life Saving Association/National Surf Life Saving Association.

1994 Lifesaving Statistics

The 1994 statistics show a general downward numerical trend since 1993 and 1992. On a positive note, this trend reflects a reduction in total drowning. Several categories have upswings, especially Preventive Actions and Public Safety Lectures, which reflect efforts of the agencies and the Association. The 1994 CSLA statistics are:



New categories included in this report comprise the Primary Rescue Cause block of data. The Association has tracked swiftwater and SCUBA rescues for several years, but has now added rip currents and surf as other 'primary causes' of rescues. Boat Assists are a new area for statistical review. Previously, much data relating to this type of activity was grouped with Boat Rescues, however, many member agencies and chapters felt the increasing number of non-emergency contacts made with boats should be identified in a separate category.

Primary Causes of Rescues

Using the data developed in 1994, the CSLA has identified the Primary Cause of Rescue to be predominately from rip currents (Figure 1, *All Beaches*). The data developed has been analyzed in three ways. First, from the perspective of all 28 reporting agencies, the data provided indicates rip currents account for 40.23% of all rescues performed by the CSLA. However, this analysis is

fundamentally flawed from perspectives. First, the data includes reports from agencies which operate open water/lake beaches without these conditions. Second, several of the reporting agencies were unable to redesign their reporting procedures to identify all the causes. Thus, well over 10,000 rescues are not attributed, classified in the analysis as 'other.' It is hoped all agencies, including the statistically important larger agencies like Los Angeles County and the State of California will be able to redesign their reporting for 1995.



In order to compensate for these inconsistencies, the data was evaluated

to identify the agencies which should be included in the primary cause analysis. This group of reporting agencies is identified as Ocean Beaches (Figure 1). This analysis finds the predominant cause of rescues again to be rip currents. In contrast with the data for All Beaches, the percentage of rescues attributed to rip currents new rises to 79.83%. Further analysis of this statistic identified one further problem with the data. Some of the agencies identified in the Ocean Beaches analysis rarely see rip currents or significant surf during the high season. The data was again examined and another analysis created, titled Surf Beaches (Figure 1). Here again, rip currents are the primary rescue cause in the CSLA, and the percentage rises to 84.72%. From this standpoint, it is possible to argue at least 80% of rescues reported with a primary cause were caused by rip currents. Given the environmental nature of the major beaches which were unable to report a 'primary cause', it is possible to theorize this figure of 80% is valid. The 1994 data, while not a long term trend analysis, confirms the position taken in The United States Lifesaving Association Manual of Open Water Lifesaving which observes: "USLA estimates that rip currents are the primary source of distress in over 80% of swimmer rescues at surf beaches."

Drowning and Lifeguards

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Review of the statistics for the last decade, from 1994 to 1985, showed a remarkable relationship between Beach Attendance and drowning. The chances of a beachgoer drowning at a beach guarded by a CSLA member agency or chapter are .000000064%. Further review of this information suggests as the decade has progressed, the incidence of drowning at a lifeguarded beach has declined, with only eight at lifeguarded beaches in 1994 (Table 1). During the decade, the highest total figure for drowning occurred in 1986, with 72 total reported drowning (Figure 2). Significantly, however, of this total, only 13 occurred at beaches with lifeguards. In 1987, an anomaly in the statistics appears. While the lowest total number of drowning in ten years at 35, the highest number of incidents at lifeguarded beaches was recorded with 19. This appears to be an unusual situation, with the majority of the incidents occurring at one agency, Los Angeles County, who also recorded a significant increase in all other categories in 1987. Review of environmental information may further explain this dramatic increase in guarded drowning for a geographically specific part of California.



For the ten year period, the CSLA recorded 457 drowning. Of this total, 362 occurred at beaches without lifeguards and 95 occurred at beaches with lifeguards. Based on the decade review, only 20.79% of recorded drowning occurred at beaches with lifeguards. If the statistical blip in 1987 is adjusted to the decade trend, the percentage falls to 17.94%. While this may seem high, it is important to remember this is total drowning for a ten year period and is only 457 drowning incidents out of a total attendance for this period of 1.471 billion beachgoers.

Activity Comparisons

Review of the 1994 statistics and data from the last decade led to two comparisons or trend analysis of specific categories. First, the data was reviewed to compare Rescues Preventive Actions (Figure 3). The initial reason for the comparison was to discover if a relationship between decreasing rescue totals resulted from an increased number of preventive actions on the part of lifeguards. Unfortunately, the data does not appear to demonstrate this hypothesis. If any conclusion can be drawn, activity levels tend to parallel each other. Clearly, other factors are more likely at work in determining rescues.





The second comparison looks at the activity levels in contrast with Beach Attendance (Figure 4). Here too, the analysis appears inconclusive. Beach Attendance has remained relatively stable while activity levels, highlighted by Rescue and Medical Aid categories, fluctuate. In 1991, for example, rescues declined substantially along with attendance, yet medical aids reached all time highs for the Association. attendance was down slightly, yet the CSLA recorded an all time high rescue statistic.2 These comparison have suggested the CSLA needs to examine other relationships and causal to activity levels. To this end. beginning in 1994, the CSLA asked agencies to comment on the environmental conditions for the year.

Weather Data

The 1994 statistics request form asked for weather data for the first time. The information is expected to be relatively subjective and unscientific. There are a number of reporting flaws, not the least of which is the concept that 'beauty is in the eye of the beholder.' Second, the view is a regional view, covering 600 miles of California coast, Hawaii and Arizona. As such, the weather information will vary due in large part to the differences in weather patterns for the various areas. On a positive note, if the assumption holds that weather is a prime indicator of activity for CSLA agency operations, then several years of weather tracking should begin to offset some of these inequities when compared with the activity trends. Increases and declines should be at least consistent locally, and the regional trend year to year generally dependable.

No activity to weather comparisons are offered this year due to lack of historical data. However, the information shows an average to below average summer for general weather, surf and wind (Table 2). With the overall activity for the CSLA down slightly, this seems to confirm the data will be usable in future statistical comparisons. It also appears to validate the long held belief that environmental conditions are clear indicators of lifeguard activity.





DATE: April 27, 1995

Thank you to the Santa Cruz Chapter for hosting this meeting. It's always fun to go on a road trip and get out of town. If you like it here in Santa Cruz I'm sure you're looking forward to returning in August for the U.S.L.A. Nationals. The dates have been set for August 10, 11 and 12. The Junior Guards will compete on the 10th, with the Lifeguard events on the 11th and 12th. I've been in contact with Jim McCray, the 1995 Nationals Chairman, and I know he's been working very hard to make the 1995 Nationals a success. If your chapter has not already received the "Travel and Accommodations Info Packet" please see me and I'll make sure you receive one. Jantzen pulled out as the title sponsor, but through the work of Jim McCray and Dick Colosi, Yamaha came on board as the title sponsor and from all preliminary indications, the event should be great. In case you didn't know, the Pacific Northwest Region, in conjunction with the Santa Cruz Surf Lifesaving Association are the hosts of the 1995 Nationals.

Unfortunately, things have not been going quite so smoothly for our Regionals. At the Fall meeting in San Clemente, the Competition Committee voted to hold both the Junior and Lifeguard Regionals in L.A. County. When Jantzen withdrew their sponsorship a monkey wrench was thrown into this plan. We had to do some scrambling, but thanks to the City of Huntington Beach and the San Clemente Ocean Festival, both J.G.'s and Lifeguard Regionals will be held, although not at the same site as we'd hoped. J.G. Regionals will be held in Huntington on Friday July 21 and the CSLSA Regionals will be at San Clemente on Saturday July 22. Please note that this is a change from the originally scheduled dates. A big thank you to the Huntington Beach Lifeguards for picking up the J.G. Regionals.

The most recent meeting of the USLA National Competition Committee was held in San Diego last November. The CSLSA had several rule change proposals pending and we were successful in getting most of them approved. The following rule changes were adopted and will take effect this season:

- (1) Masters and Veterans events will be held as Finals in the morning.
- (2) All events will now score for team scoring, not just the top 8.
- (3) Relays must be signed up by team captains <u>only</u>. This is so we don't get each member of a relay team signing up for the relay events. This includes two person events such as the

Rescue Race and the Rescue Board Rescue Race.

(4) The Veterans will now compete in all the same races as the Masters, to be run at the same time.

Three of our proposed rule changes failed, but I feel that the most important ones passed. Surfboat (dory) rule changes and the question of a Seniors Division for Women were not addressed; if you want these items addressed next year, you need to bring them to the Competition Meeting today. The use of wetsuits in cold water was also discussed and it was determined that if a change from the **no wetsuit** policy was desired, that it must be proposed as a rule change.

Other items that were discussed at the last National Meeting were the need for a high quality, standardized medal for Nationals that includes an inscription of the year and the event. Permanent funding for a National Team to represent the USLA at World Titles was discussed with the feeling being that some source of financing must be secured. Dick Colosi was given the go-ahead to try to secure this kind of funding. This does not preclude anybody from also securing funds for a USLA National Team to compete at a World Titles.

The other point of interest that was discussed in committee, was that following the 1995 Games, the Nationals should revert back to the National Board of Directors, echoing the feelings expressed at the October CSLSA Board of Directors Meeting. This would mean that the Nationals would be the responsibility of the National USLA Competition Committee and not of the Region that they happen to be in. I feel that this would hopefully give a sense of greater continuity to the Nationals.

Don't forget that the 10'6" Paddleboard is now the standard for all Regional and National Competition; the 12 foot boards will not be allowed.

The 1996 World Titles, "Rescue 96" are scheduled for Durban, South Africa in May of 1996. There are plans to hold a World Masters Titles in conjunction with the event as well. I have some brochures about the event. Please see me if you are interested.

I also have some brochures about the Craig Hummer Ocean Ironman Clinics to be offered this summer. These clinics may be of special interest to your Junior Guard Programs. Please see me for details.

Thanks to Bill Richardson, the CSLSA has been invited to be a part of the U.S. Open of Surfing at Huntington Pier on Saturday, August 5th. Prime Sports Events Group has approved the following events:

- 1. Three lap Dory Race
- 2. One lap Surf Ski Race
- 3. One lap 10'6" Rescue Board Race
- 4. Surf Rescue Race
- 5. Ironman
- 6. American Ironman

Entries will have to be limited, and will probably be based on Regionals results. I would like to

discuss this in committee today. There would be awards for the top three in each event as well as "incentive gift packages" for each competitor. The opportunity to receive outstanding TV coverage is another incentive that must not be overlooked.

The PSLA schedule has been presented to me as follows:

June 24 at the Manhattan Pier July 1 at East Beach, Santa Barbara July 8 at San Clemente Pier July 15 at Oceanside Pier August 19 at Zuma Beach

I have recently revised and updated the USLA National Lifeguard Championship Rule Book. If you would like a copy, it is available for the cost of duplication, binding and postage, probably about \$4.00 per copy. I would also be happy to supply it on disk (Word Perfect 6.0a Windows) for about \$1.00. Disk copies would not include course diagrams.

Finally, I'm happy to report that I saw Paul Donohue the other day and he was looking great. Paul recently had a bout with brain cancer, but from the looks of things, he won this round. He's back to work and appears to be doing very well.

1. New Zealand Exchange

A. Finances

- 3. AB 1 4 4 relates to changing the length of sentence for crimes of attempted murder on a Peace Officer from life with seven years minimum to life with 1 5 years minimum. Recommended by committees to seek ways to include lifeguards on these kinds of bills.
