Icontinue to keep very busy with the business of CSLSA and USLA and correspondence continues to increase. The following are the highlights of activities or issues I have worked on this pat six months.

Executive Board

Since our last General Board Meeting the Executive board has met on at least three occasions. The replacements to the board have participated very well in the business of the organization and represented CSLSA at the National Board meeting in Virginia.

Our next National Meeting is in Santa Rosa, California in two weeks. I have brochures if there are any of you interested in attending. Rooms are scarce at the host hotel, but other arrangements can be made.

CSLSA Regional Championships

Since the last meeting we have signed a letter of agreement with Huntington Beach SLSA to host the 1999 Regional Games in Huntington Beach. Kai Weisser and Rob McGowan will each report more on our games in their reports.

USLA signed an agreement with Foster's for sponsorship of the National and Regional Games. CSLSA will receive approximately \$5,000 for our share of the sponsorship money.

2000 and 2001 Championships

At our last meeting, Rob McGowan asked for interested parties to forward proposals for hosting the 2000 and 2001 Regionals. since that time, the Pacific Northwest Region has given us the rights to the 2000 National Championships. Again, Rob has asked for proposals from all interested Chapters. he will report on the progress of both inquiries in his Competition Report.

Ocean Beach

The Ocean Beach situation in San Francisco has been successfully resolved. The National Park Service will be placing lifeguards on this dangerous beach. Through the efforts of Chris Brewster, Bob Burnside, Rick Gould and Carl Drake from our region and Bob fennel from the Pacific Northwest, the NPS was given an opportunity to work with USLA/CSLSA members to develop a system of service that will serve the public and provide for added safety.

Recognition of Chris Brewster

I would like to personally thank Chris Brewster for the sincere effort he makes at improving the standard of care provided the public and specifically through lifesaving. His efforts at taking on the NPS, head on, along with editorial assistance from Dr. Bernard Nietschmann and Francis Smith, both from Berkeley, put so much pressure on the NPS that they felt compelled to accept USLA's offer of assistance in finding a suitable remedy for the problems at Ocean Beach.

This is not the first time Chris has taken on a service for similar reasons. Panama City also was under very close scrutiny due to a very high drowning rate and the light Chris shined on them through the media. Although that circumstance was not as successful as Ocean Beach, conditions did improve.

Chris is extremely straight forward in his opinions and often misunderstood as to his motives. But having worked with him these past two years, particularly in matters of certification or with regard to standards of lifesaving, I have found his motives to totally beneficial to the public and highly relevant to the association's goals and objectives. My heartfelt thanks to Chris specifically, but also to the entire Executive Board.

Spring 1999 Board of Directors Meeting

Legislation

- <u>Boating Safety</u> The City of San Diego is sponsoring Assembly Bill 1287, the California Boating Safety Act. If enacted, this bill would:
 - 1. Create a standard curriculum for training recreational boaters.
 - 2. Develop a statewide testing program.
 - 3. Issue certificates to those who pass the test.
 - 4. Make special provisions to accommodate short term visitors.
 - 5. Require possession of a certificate to operate a motorboat over 15 horsepower.
 - 6. Allow reciprocity with other state programs.
 - 7. Increase the minimum age for wearing a lifejacket on a moving vessel from six to eleven.
 - 8. Require wearing of a lifejacket by personal watercraft riders and water-skiers.
 - 9. Require a boating safety class for persons convicted of designated boating safety offenses.
- <u>Surfing Legislation</u> The City of San Diego is considering sponsoring legislation aimed at reducing surf violence. This has received significant national and international press. A final decision on whether to move forward has yet to be reached.

USLA Website – USLA.ORG

- As editor of the site, I am happy to report that it continues to enjoy strong support. We see messages on the bulletin boards from around the world.
- We have added the Lifeguard Library, an area for the posting of articles and research papers pertinent to lifesaving. The articles may be downloaded for free.
- Work is being finalized on advertising for the USLA site. Banner ads will appear on the home page and the bulletin boards, as these are the highest traffic areas. This will produce income to USLA and offset the cost of the site.

San Diego Regional Lifeguard Academy

- This academy continues to thrive. Session #1 of 1999 seasonal lifeguard training was recently conducted. One of the graduates is 59 years old. His son is an instructor in the academy. Session #2 will include students from Argentina and Panama.
- The academy conducted its first PWC training course with 30 students. It will soon conduct an IRB academy. Eventually, an associates degree in lifesaving will be offered to those who complete all of the training modules.

Florida Tour

• I visited Florida in late March and was hosted at a reception given by the Florida Beach Patrol Chief's Association at the home of Rich Connell, head of Delray Beach. This was an excellent opportunity to encourage exchange of ideas and build relationships. The Southeast Region has been struggling recently, but appears to be trying to get back on track.

Certification Program

- Interest in the Certification Program continues to increase, with new applicants. Applications from Del Mar and Port Hueneme are in process. Unfortunately, Santa Barbara has dropped out.
- All CSLSA affiliated agencies are currently certified or in the process of certification except for the following: City of Capitola, Avila Beach - Port St. Luis Harbor, Morro Bay, San Luis Obispo, Coronado, Santa Barbara, Seal Beach, Tucson, and Ventura County. These agencies are encouraged to apply for certification.
- Orange County, which contracts for lifeguards with US Ocean Safety, will be going out for bid again in the near future. I have encouraged the manager of this process to require USLA certification as a minimum standard.
- There has been an unusual problem with the standards at a certified East Coast lifeguard agency
 allegedly failing to meet certification standards. This will be addressed at the national meeting. It
 is important to note however, that the community considers its certification so important that the
 Public Safety Director has indicated that he will be attending the spring USLA Board meeting to
 explain the reasons behind the problem and to request some further consideration of their issues.

International Life Saving

- I will be attending a special meeting in Montreal in early May. This will be a goal setting meeting. In September, I will attend a regular meeting in the United Kingdom.
- Rescue 2000 will take place in Sydney, Australia in March 2000. Extensive information on this
 event is available on the Surf Life Saving Australia website. For a link to this site, visit USLA.ORG.

International Congress on Drowning 2002

 The Society to Promote the Salvage of Drowning Victims, based in The Netherlands and founded in 1767, will convene the International Congress on Drowning 2002. It will include several task forces on a variety of topics. I have been appointed to chair the Rescue Task Force. This conference is being planned three years in advance.

Ocean Beach

 I am pleased to announce that the National Park Service is in the process of hiring and training lifeguards to be deployed at Ocean Beach this summer. This is a tremendous success for USLA and ILS, but even more importantly for the safety of Ocean Beach users.

AMENDED IN ASSEMBLY APRIL 7, 1999

CALIFORNIA LEGISLATURE-1999-2000 REGULAR SESSION

ASSEMBLY BILL

No. 1287

Introduced by Assembly Member Davis

February 26, 1999

An act to amend Section 668.1 of Sections 658.3 and 668.1 of, and to repeal and add Section 658.6 of, the Harbors and Navigation Code, relating to vessels.

LEGISLATIVE COUNSEL'S DIGEST

AB 1287, as amended, Davis. Operation of vessels: boating safety courses.

(1) Existing law prohibits a person from operating a motorboat, sailboat, or vessel that is 26 feet or less in length unless every person who is 6 years of age or younger is wearing a type I, II, or III Coast Guard-approved personal flotation device, or unless the person is operating a sailboat on which the person who is 6 years of age or younger is restrained, as provided, or the person is operating a vessel on which the person who is 6 years of age or younger is in an enclosed cabin.

This bill would make those requirements that currently apply to a person who is 6 years of age or younger, instead, apply to a person who is 11 years of age or younger, and would require the flotation device to be a type I, II, III, or V Coast Guard-approved personal flotation device. The bill would also require any person aboard a personal watercraft or any person being towed behind a vessel on water skis, an aquaplane, or similar device to wear a type I, II, III, or V Coast

Guard-approved personal flotation device, except as provided. Because other existing law makes a violation of these requirements a crime, the bill would impose a state-mandated local program.

(2) Under existing law, the Department of Boating and Waterways was required to report to the Legislature, by October 1, 1998, on its recommendations for enhancement and expansion of boating safety and education. Existing law required the Director of Boating and Waterways, by February 1, 1998, to appoint a Boating and Safety Advisory Committee.

This bill would repeal those provisions. The bill would require the department, on or before June 1, 2000, to develop and make available to all interested parties, a model curriculum for the instruction of recreational boaters in safe boating principles and regulations. The bill would require the department to develop a written test, on or before January 1, 2002, to test persons on their knowledge and understanding of the curriculum and would provide for the issuance of a Class A or B certificate, as provided, to any person who successfully passes the test.

The bill would provide that beginning September 1, 2002, no person under the age of 21, except as specified, may operate a vessel powered by a motor of greater than 15 horsepower upon the waters of the state unless the person has successfully passed the test and has a valid certificate, as provided. The bill would make that prohibition applicable to persons under the age of 31 beginning June 1, 2003, to persons under the age of 41 beginning June 1, 2004, and to all persons beginning June 1, 2005. The bill would make any person who violates those provisions guilty of an infraction, thereby imposing a state-mandated local program.

Existing

(3) Existing law provides that any person convicted of specified provisions of existing law governing the operation of vessels may be ordered by the court to complete and pass a boating safety course approved by the Department of Boating and Waterways department, when the conviction resulted from the unlawful operation of a vessel.

This bill would require, rather than permit, the person to be ordered by the court to complete and pass the course.

__ 3 __ AB 1287

California Constitution requires the state reimburse local agencies and school districts for certain costs Statutory provisions bv the state. procedures for making that reimbursement.

This bill would provide that no reimbursement is required by this act for a specified reason.

Vote: majority. Appropriation: no. Fiscal committee: no yes. State-mandated local program: no yes.

The people of the State of California do enact as follows:

SECTION 1. This act shall be known and may be cited as the California Boating and Safety Act.

SEC. 2. Section 658.3 of the Harbors and Navigation Code is amended to read: 4

658.3. (a) No person shall operate a motorboat, sailboat, or vessel that is 26 feet or less in length unless every person on board who is six 11 years of age or less is wearing a type I, II, or V Coast Guard-approved personal flotation device while that motorboat, sailboat, 10 or vessel is underway.

- (b) Subdivision (a) does not apply to a person 12 operating a sailboat on which a person who is six 11 years of age or less is restrained by a harness tethered to the vessel, or to a person operating a vessel on which a person who is six 11 years of age or less is in an enclosed cabin.
- (c) Any person on board a personal watercraft or any person being towed behind a vessel on water skis, an 17 18 aquaplane, or similar device shall wear a type I, II, III, or V Coast Guard-approved personal flotation device, unless 19 that person is described in paragraph (1), (2), or (3) of subdivision (c) of Section 658.5. 21
- (d) Subdivision (a) does and (c) do not apply to a 22 person operating a motorboat, sailboat, or vessel if the operator is reacting to an emergency rescue situation. 24

25 (d)

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- (e) The following definitions govern the construction 26 27 of this section:
- 28 (1) "Enclosed cabin" means a space on board a vessel that is surrounded by bulkheads and covered by a roof.

- (2) "Operate a motorboat, sailboat, or vessel" means to be in control or in charge of a motorboat, sailboat, or vessel while it is underway.
- (3) "Underway" means all times except when the motorboat, sailboat, or vessel is anchored, moored, or 5 6 aground.

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- this section is an infraction 8 (f) A violation of punishable as provided in subdivision (a) of Section 668. 9
- SEC. 3. Section 658.6 of the Harbors and Navigation 10 Code is repealed. 11
 - 658.6. (a) The department, by October 1, 1998, shall report to the Legislature on its recommendations for enhancement and expansion of boating safety and education. The recommendations shall consider the findings and data in the department's annual California Boating Accident Report and shall focus on strategies to improve vessel-operator knowledge and boating safety. The department's study shall include, but not be limited to, an examination of both voluntary and mandatory education.
- (b) In preparing the report required by subdivision (a), the director, by February 1, 1998, shall appoint a Boating Safety Advisory Committee which shall include, but not be limited to, representatives of the Boating and Waterways Commission; boating law enforcement agencies; the United States Power Squadron; the United States Coast Guard Auxiliary; entities that provide boating education courses; personal watercraft 28 29 organizations; boat dealers and yacht brokers; boating, 30 sailing, and yachting organizations; owners and operators 32 of public and private marina facilities; boat rental operators; lifeguards and harbormasters; and boating 33 34 accident victims. The committee shall meet and present 35 recommendations to the department by July 1, 1998. The 36 members of the committee shall serve without 37 eompensation and shall not be reimbursed by the state for 38 expenses. The department shall assist the committee in earrying out its duties.

SEC. 4. Section 658.6 is added to the Harbors and 2 Navigation Code, to read:

658.6. (a) On or before June 1, 2000, the department shall develop and make available to all interested parties 5 a model curriculum for the instruction of recreational 6 boaters in safe boating principles and regulations. The curriculum shall not be designed or intended to instruct participants on how to operate any particular type of 9 boat, but rather shall be designed to instruct participants 10 on safe boating principles and laws that apply to all practicable, the greatest degree To boaters. curriculum shall be designed to ensure reciprocity with 12 similar programs in other states. 13

(b) On or before January 1, 2002, the department shall develop a written test to test persons on their knowledge 16 and understanding of the curriculum described subdivision (a). The department shall determine an 18 appropriate passing grade for the test. A wallet-sized certificate shall be issued to any person who successfully 20 passes the test. Two classes of certificates shall be issued

21 as follows:

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(1) A Class A certificate shall be primarily intended for a resident of the state or a regular visitor, but shall be 23 available to any person. A Class A certificate shall be issued by the department and shall be valid for the life of 25 the recipient on any waterway within the state. Testing for a Class A certificate shall be proctored by persons 27 specifically designated by the department. There shall be 29 no less than one location available for testing in each county. Testing locations shall be designated in a manner intended to make them as convenient as possible to the 31 maximum number of persons. The department shall 32 develop a statewide database, accessible 33 enforcement officers, of persons who successfully pass the 34 35 test and who have been issued a Class A certificate.

(2) A Class B certificate shall be primarily intended for 37 a boat renter or short-term visitor, but shall be available to any person. A Class B certificate may be issued by any 39 person who is 18 years of age or older and who is 40 specifically designated by the department to administer -- 6 --

I the test and issue the certificate, including, but not limited to, a rental agent, boat dealer, yacht club official, 3 or any other person designated by the department. A 4 person designated under this paragraph to administer the 5 test shall be authorized to conduct testing onsite at his or 6 her facility. A Class B certificate shall be valid for no more 7 than 14 consecutive days and shall allow for operation 8 only of vessels specified, and only upon waters 9 designated, on the certificate. A person authorized to 10 administer the test shall keep adequate records, as 11 specified by the department, that the department may 12 inspect at any time to ensure compliance. 13 department may revoke the right to administer tests and 14 issue Class B certificates for good cause. Prior to 15 developing the requirements for a Class B certificate, the comments from interested 16 department shall solicit 17 parties for a period of not less than 30 days. 18

(c) On or before January 1, 2002, the department shall 19 review boater education programs developed in other mandatory boater education pursuant 20 states those determine which of 21 requirements and shall 22 programs meet standards substantially equivalent to the and subdivisions (a) (b). 23 requirements of 24 department shall maintain an updated public database

25 that lists those programs.

(e) Any person who violates subdivision (d) is guilty 8 of an infraction punishable by a fine of not more than fifty dollars (\$50) and shall be required to take a course, 10 approved by the department, that meets the curriculum 11 requirements of subdivision (b).

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(f) The department may charge a fee to each person 13 who is issued a certificate pursuant to subdivision (b). 14 The fee shall be no more than the cost, on a prorated basis, 15 to implement the requirements of this section, not to 16 exceed ten dollars (\$10). However, the fee may be adjusted annually, commencing January 1, 2001, to reflect 17 changes in the consumer price index and may exceed ten dollars (\$10) upon the adjustment.

(g) The department adopt regulations shall implement this section.

(h) Commencing January 1, 2001, the department 22 23 shall include within its annual California Boating Safety 24 Report an update on the progress of this program and its 25 impact on boating safety.

SEC. 5. Section 668.1 of the Harbors and Navigation 26 27 Code is amended to read:

668.1. (a) Any person convicted of a violation of subdivision (b), (c), (d), (e), or (f) of Section 655 pertaining to a mechanically propelled vessel but not to manipulating any water skis, an aquaplane, or similar device, when the conviction resulted from the operation of a vessel, shall be ordered by the court to complete and pass a boating safety course approved by the department.

(b) Any person convicted of a violation of subdivision 35 (a) of Section 655 or of Section 655.2, 655.6, 658, or 658.5 36 of this code, or Section 191.5 of the Penal Code, when the conviction resulted from the unlawful operation of a vessel, shall be ordered by the court to complete and pass 40 a boating safety course approved by the department.

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(e) Any person convicted of a violation of Section 655.2, 655.6, 658, or 658.5 of this code, or Section 191.5 of the Penal Code, when the conviction resulted from the operation of a vessel within seven years of a previous conviction of any of those violations, shall be ordered by the court to complete and pass a boating safety course approved by the department.

(c) Any person who has been ordered by the court to 10 complete and pass a boating safety course pursuant to this section shall submit to the court proof of completion and passage of the course within seven months of the time of 13 his or her conviction. The proof shall be in a form that has 14 been approved by the department and that provides for 15 the ability to submit the form to the court through the 16 United States Postal Service. If the person who has been required to complete and pass a boating safety course is 18 under 18 years of age, the court may require that the 19 person obtain parental consent to enroll in the course. If 20 the person does not complete and pass the boating safety course, the court may extend the period for completion 22 or impose another penalty as prescribed by statute.

(e)

(d) The department shall adopt regulations to carry 25 out this section, including approval of boating safety 26 education courses, prescribing the forms for proof of completion and passage, and setting forth any fees to be 28 charged to course participants, which fees shall not 29 exceed the expenses associated with providing 30 course.

SEC. 6. No reimbursement is required by this act 32 pursuant to Section 6 of Article XIIIB of the California 33 Constitution because the only costs that may be incurred 34 by a local agency or school district will be incurred 35 because this act creates a new crime or infraction, 36 eliminates a crime or infraction, or changes the penalty 37 for a crime or infraction, within the meaning of Section 38 17556 of the Government Code, or changes the definition

1 of a crime within the meaning of Section 6 of Article 2 XIII B of the California Constitution.

At the Fall 1998 USLA National Meeting many rule change proposals we voted on. Most of them did not pass. The three that did pass were the addition of a Women's 1 lap surfboat race, the adoption of the "M" shaped course for the board and ski legs of the Ironman/Ironwoman, and the correction of the minimum weight for the rescue board weight in the rulebook. These changes will take effect for this summer's competitions. The rulebook has already been updated and can be downloaded from the USLA web site.

This is the time to come up with rule changes we would like to see for next (2000) year. I know the women would like to see their age divisions expanded to mirror the men's, and the idea of creating Divisions for team points at Nationals based on chapter size was discussed. If you have anything that you would like to see proposed, bring it to committee.

The HBSLSA will be hosting the Lifeguard and JG Regionals again this year. The dates are July 15 for Lifeguards and July 16 for the Juniors. The 1999 Nationals are in Cape May, NJ. They have a web site with lodging and other information that can be linked to through the USLA site. I encourage you to check it out and make plans early, as Cape May always puts on a good event and many of the accommodations are already booked. There is supposed to be a meeting of all interested rowers to see if a majority would like to see two classes of boats in the surfboat race. This may be the rowers last chance to make your voice heard. There has been much heated discussion on the USLA web site bulletin board, and I would really like to see this issue resolved.

Other competitions scheduled include the All-Women Tournament at Gateway National Recreation Area in New York on July 28. Please call Carl Martinez at (718) 354-7946 for complete information. You can also leave a message at (800) 678-7946. The Taplin Medley Relay is scheduled for July 31 at the Manhattan Beach Pier. It's not too early to start putting your team together now. It would be great to see more participation from all CSLSA Chapters in this historic event.

The ASRA (formerly Bud Light) events are tentative at this point, pending funding. There will be a couple of events for sure, but the whole five-stop tour is still a question mark. I have attached a 1999 Competition Schedule for those interested.

The 2000 Nationals will be in our region, since the Pacific Northwest declined to host them. I have received positive responses from a couple of chapters. We will review and make recommendations in today's committee meeting. We need proposals from Chapters and Agencies in the Region to host upcoming Nationals and Regionals, from 2000 on. Let's see some of the Chapters that have never hosted step forward and get involved. It would be nice to see some new competition venues.

Also coming in the year 2000 is *Rescue 2000* in Sydney, Australia on March 23 through April 2. With the beach events at Manly, it promises to be the biggest lifesaving event yet. Check out their web site at www.surflifesaving.com.au/rescue2000. We need to continue to pursue funding to support the U.S. team. If you have any ideas, you can contact me or team manager, Tim Gallagher. Please spread the word that the USLA team will be selected based on the results of the 1999 Nationals in Cape May, and will consist of a maximum of six men and six women competitors. In addition to the World National Teams Championship, the World Inter Club, World Masters, and three World boat Championships will be contested. Make your plans early if you want to attend what should be the greatest show to date in World Lifesaving competition.

Dear Bill:

It is my pleasure to advise you of our sincere desire to host the United States Lifesaving Association 2000 National Competition. As a former San Diego lifeguard, former Executive Director of USLA, and current Deputy Mayor of San Diego, I am committed to this endeavor, since I believe it will be of enormous benefit to the competitors, spectators, and citizens of San Diego.

We plan to hold the event at Pacific Beach, adjacent to Crystal Pier. This location will eliminate the need for shuttle buses and parking is free. There are numerous hotels, restaurants, grocery stores, and other amenities within easy walking distance. In fact, we believe we can hold all of the events, day and night, within a ½ mile radius.

Hotels, available within a few blocks, can be expected to be available for under \$100/night. Hotels within driving distance can be expected to be available for under \$50/night. The Catamaran Hotel, host hotel of the International Life Saving Federation Medical/Rescue Conference and a prior site of a USLA Board of Directors meeting, is less than ½ mile from the competition venue. Crystal Pier itself, which will provide an ideal viewing platform, also includes hotel rooms.

We expect to raise no less than \$50,000 locally in funds and in-kind services. We plan to hire a recognized, professional event organizer to handle logistics for the event and to ensure a smooth operation. Provided that USLA is able to match our local fund raising with at least \$50,000 cash, we would be willing to guarantee net income to USLA of no less than \$5,000. This coupled with a variety of top-notch after-hours events for the competitors, similar to those provided at the 1997 National Competition, makes San Diego an attractive, spirited host location.

As a major destination, airfares to San Diego are reasonable and the airport is within a 15 minute drive (about a \$15 cab ride) from the proposed venue. Public transportation is available within one block of the venue.

As you know, August weather in San Diego is temperate and water temperature is usually in the low 70s. Mission Bay is close enough to the event site to be used as an alternative venue in case of large surf.

San Diego attractions include the world famous San Diego Zoo, Sea World, Legoland, Wild Animal Park, Stephen Birch Aquarium, La Jolla, and nearby Tijuana. Disneyland is a short train ride to the north. In downtown, the Gaslamp Quarter has become a nationally recognized center for evening entertainment with terrific restaurants and theaters.

Building on our experience from the 1997 National Competition, we have chosen a location we consider ideal and have planned a variety of contingencies to ensure that the event is the best ever for USLA. I look forward to the opportunity to discuss this with you further and hope sincerely for an affirmative decision.

CSLSA HEROIC ACTS COMMITTEE Spring meeting, April 15-16, 1999 Long Beach, Ca.

On behalf of the USLA, CSLA will present the Medal of Valor to Laguna Beach Lifeguard Patrick Quiqley, for a multiple victim rescue performed on May 10, 1998 at Diver's Cove, Laguna Beach. Quigley entered a small rocky channel known as "Giggle Crack" in large surf conditions, rescuing three victims, a child and two adults. Quigley and victims were submerged for a multiple wave hold down and battered repeatedly against the rocks. Despite Quigley's urgent need for air, he refused to lose his grip on the ankle of the submerged child until several waves had passed and he was able to surface with the victim.

Of particular significance, Patrick Quigley was awarded a Medal of Valor in the fall of 1998 for his participation in multiple rescues performed in extreme El Nino mudslide conditions on February 23rd, 1998. Quigley is the first multiple recipient of the USLA Medal of Valor.

Committee continues to refine the Medal of Valor medallion and anticipates presenting the finished product to the USLA Board later this spring.
